This has changed lots of opinions at school, as many thought that all pigeons are like the ones you see in town and city centres. I spoke about how no one really knows how a pigeon makes it home, and some fun facts about the fastest and most expensive pigeons.

The best part of my talk was releasing some pigeons in our school playground, and I still get asked questions. Many asked if they made it home, even though we only live around the corner!

I love pigeons, and really enjoy the race season, as I get to help out at our club, carrying baskets and cleaning out.

The thing that interested me was the pigeons and their acts of bravery. The first pigeon was Mary of Exeter, who flew many military missions across the English Channel back to her box in Exeter. She was owned by a bootmaker and pigeon breeder, Cecil Brewer. Her role was to provide critical intelligence to the Allies by delivering top

secret messages from behind enemy lines. She completed four successful missions from France. Returning home

from one mission, she was found to have suffered wounds to her neck and breast, missing wingtips and three shotgun pellets in her body. She was nursed back to health by her owner, and once again returned to action for the

National Pigeon Service. On her final mission, she returned home with a vital message but had suffered major injuries to her neck from shrapnel. The neck injury was so severe that Cecil Brewer made a special collar out of leather to support her neck and hold her head up. She was officially retired from service.

If that wasn't remarkable enough, while recuperating and in retirement her pigeon loft was bombed by the


Luftwaffe. Many pigeons were killed, but Mary survived. In 1945 she was awarded the PDSA Dickin Medal for

> outstanding endurance on war service in spite of wounds. What a hero! There were also other many heroes, such as Cher Ami, William Of Orange, Paddy and GI Joe. Real superheroes. What can I say - what a day!

I would like to say a special thank you to all the NHS staff, Doctors and Nurses, Paramedics, Police, Fire Service, Post, Delivery Drivers and other essential workers in the front line.

I have decided to call my loft Rainbow Lofts, as my tribute to the NHS. I hope that the RPRA name a special race to all of these great and brave people.


